What happened in 2017—2018? A lot.

Network participation continued to rise

- 32% increase

Active in more countries

- 31 countries; went from 6 to 17 in-country programs

Increased demand for technical support

- 40% increase in Country Support Hub requests

Supported more peer learning & exchange

- Brought TTF cohorts together; PLS; 18 exchanges

Added new thematic priorities

- Alignment; strategic communications

Produced more knowledge resources

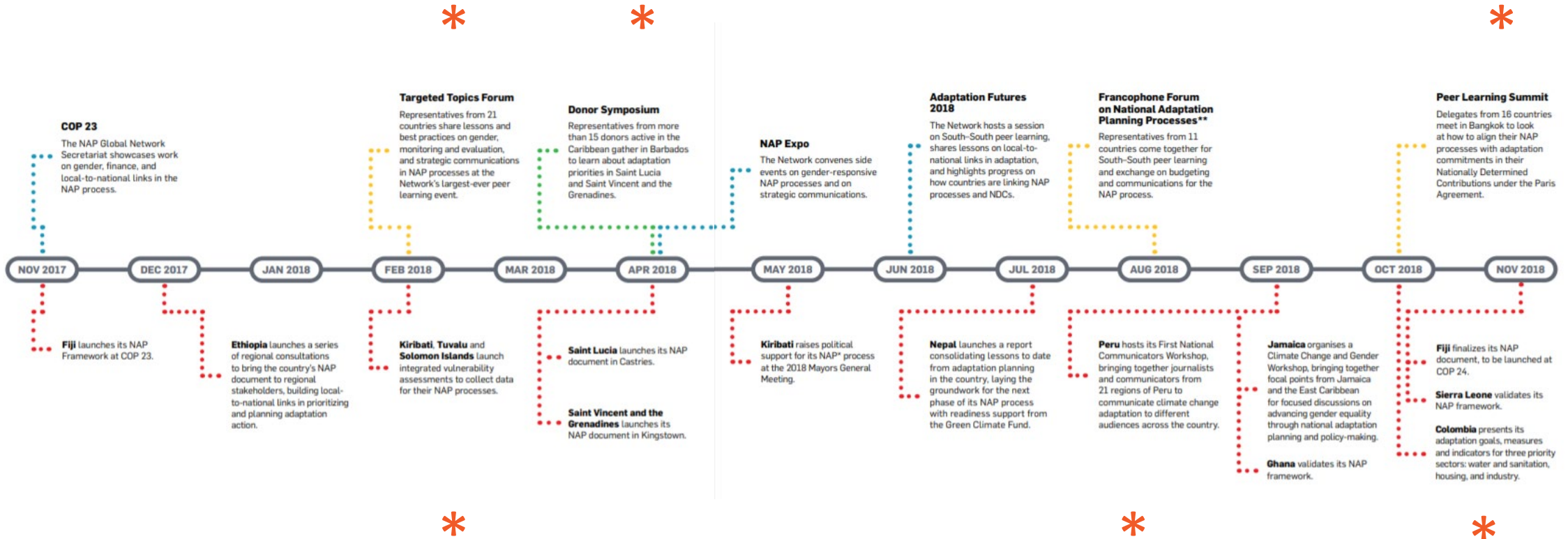
- 11 publications, 14 blogs, 9 posters, 7 videos; 2 webinars

Secretariat grew

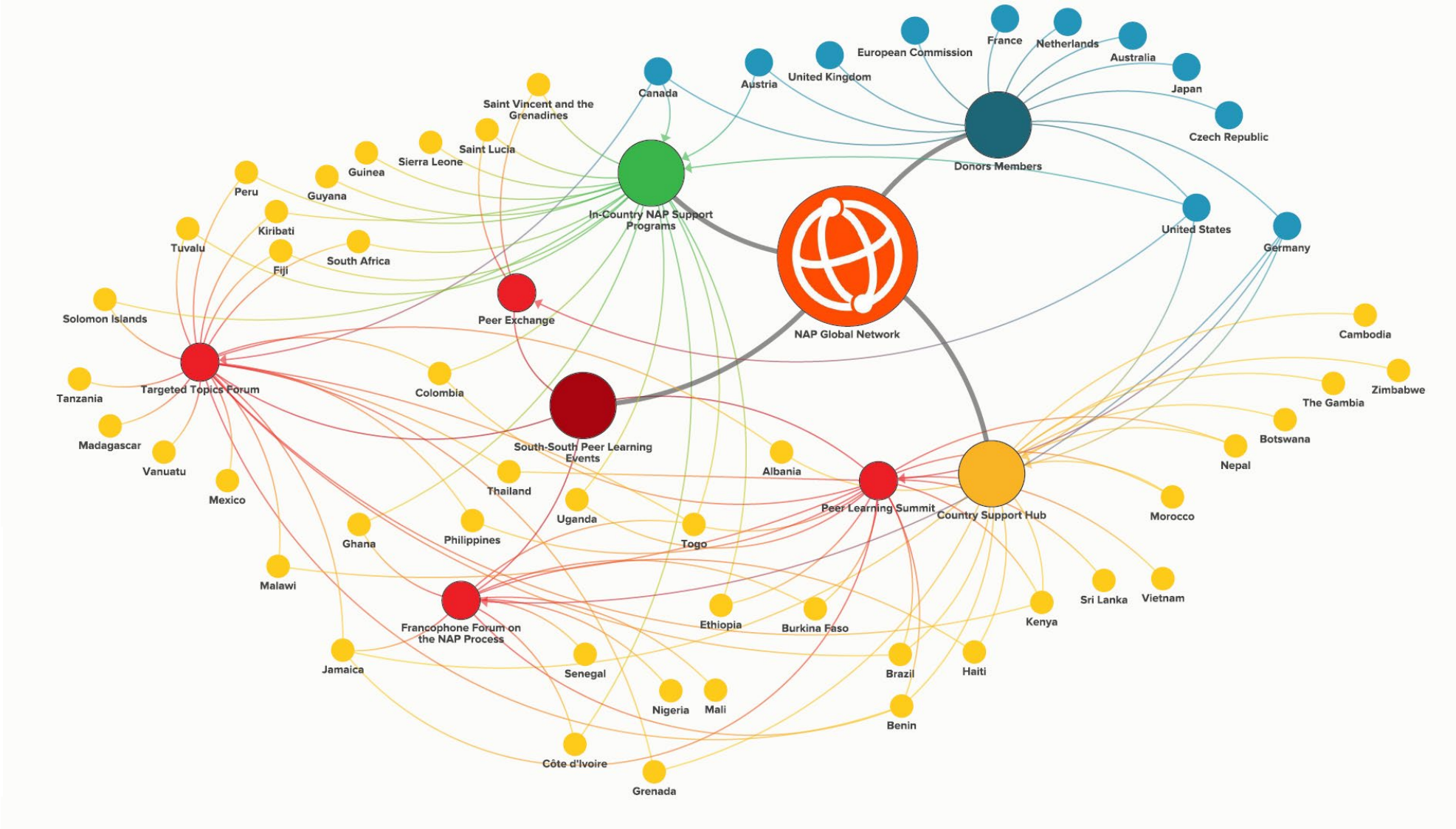

- Build on this to be *the* go-to resource – stories of progress, database



Reflections

Strong partnerships established

- Good for coordination but take a lot of work to leverage
- NDCP, GCF, NAP GSP, NAP-Ag, CDKN, OECD

Need to be careful not to stretch ourselves too thin

- How many CSH a year? How many more in-country programs?
- Seven thematic priorities already – can we take on more?

Paying more attention to the UNFCCC process, bodies

- More questions around NDCs, Adaptation Communications
- Strategic engagement with constituted bodies

Need to lock in this level of funding to the end of 2023

- To maximize investments we've made and see impact at national and global levels
